the buzz of stepping up to and overcoming every challenge thrown my way. Financially I wasn't fortunate when I was young. I remember I used to sit in the back of my parents' car when we drove past beautiful houses and I'd say: "I want to live in one of those big houses when I grow up." I always believed I would. I'm a positive thinker and I believe that the journey doesn't ever finish – no matter what you have, you always want more, but the trick is above all to enjoy the journey.

Many people claim to be 'interior designers'. What makes you different?

I think you've either got it or you haven't. I've come across a lot of people who think they can set up an interior design company, but what strikes me more than anything is their lack of passion. Without passion they are set to fail. I am 100% passionate about my business and I believe fully in my





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capabilities and myself. My clients are my biggest critics and I have yet to disappoint them. It's also very important for me to be 'hands on' with my clients no matter how many projects are on the go at once.

What's your top tip for businesswomen out there?

My advice is to believe in yourself, be confident and listen to your instincts. In my opinion these qualities will be fundamental to your success.

You must have been thrilled to win your recent award?

Yes, absolutely. I won the Inspirational Award for Women in Business, and was both thrilled and surprised to receive it. It was such an honour!

How did you enjoy your time on Channel 4's Four Rooms? And how did you get the part?

I loved working on the show. I'd never been on TV before and hadn't even considered it. One night I noticed online that Channel 4 were asking for people to send pictures of their vintage or interesting treasures. Much to my daughter's horror, I sent a picture of myself and asked: "What about me as one of the dealers? Just check out my website and let me know." So they did and they called me the next morning. It was assertive, but that's just me.

Having never done something like this before, were you nervous being in front of a camera?

Yes, I was terrified! The screen test was so scary; in fact I can now say that was probably one of my biggest fears of all time.



The money used in the TV programme was your own money, so how did that feel?

It was really exciting, but because we were in a studio for over two weeks in total, picked up when it was dark and dropped home when it was dark, with long days, I had to give myself a talking to and get a grip because I was exhausted! There were times when I felt as if my money was Monopoly money. I imagine I would have felt the same if I'd been in a casino for two weeks straight.

What was the strangest object brought onto the show?

That had to be Hitler's toilet, which was brought over from the US! It was absolutely filthy and was supposed to be from one of his ships. I had too many questions, including the obvious: "How do we know that Hitler actually sat on it?"

Were any controversial items brought on to the show?

Yes! There was a very unpleasant piece of art that sent shivers down my spine. It was a sculpture commemorating the horrors of the Auschwitz concentration camp, in which Danish artist Marco Evaristti, a Chilean-born Buddhist convert with Jewish parents, used teeth and gold fillings. He said these teeth and fillings came from a person in Austria who claimed they were taken from the Nazi death camp. He also threw in a few teeth from his Jewish grandmother who did not die in the camp. It was an amazing piece of art and had diamonds and white gold, but there were disturbing skulls of red gold looking out of the window of a train. Needless to say we were all pretty shocked and none of us offered any money for it.
